MINORS & CERTIFICATES

Pairing majors and minors is pretty easy. I'm double majoring in Criminology and <u>Psychology</u> because I wanted to learn about crime and I wanted to learn about the workings of the brain behind it. Don't be scared to talk to professors before you make your choice. The professors here really want you to succeed, so if you talk to them, you will get a better understanding of your options before you decide.

I have a <u>Mental Health</u> minor. Especially now I think it's really important to have a better understanding of mental health. I also have a Conflict Resolution certificate. We have a lot of certificates within like Criminology, Anthropology, and Sociology, so those are better if you don't want to have a full load with a major and a minor.

I have a <u>Sociology</u> minor as well, which focuses on a broader scope of people, whereas Psychology is more individualized. If you don't want to focus on anatomy or reading heavy material, Sociology is super fun.

If you want to get into crime scene or evidence tech, you do need a background in <u>Biology</u> or <u>Chemistry</u>, which a lot of students don't know. So pairing Criminology with a science major or minor can help you if that is your career goal.
